Background

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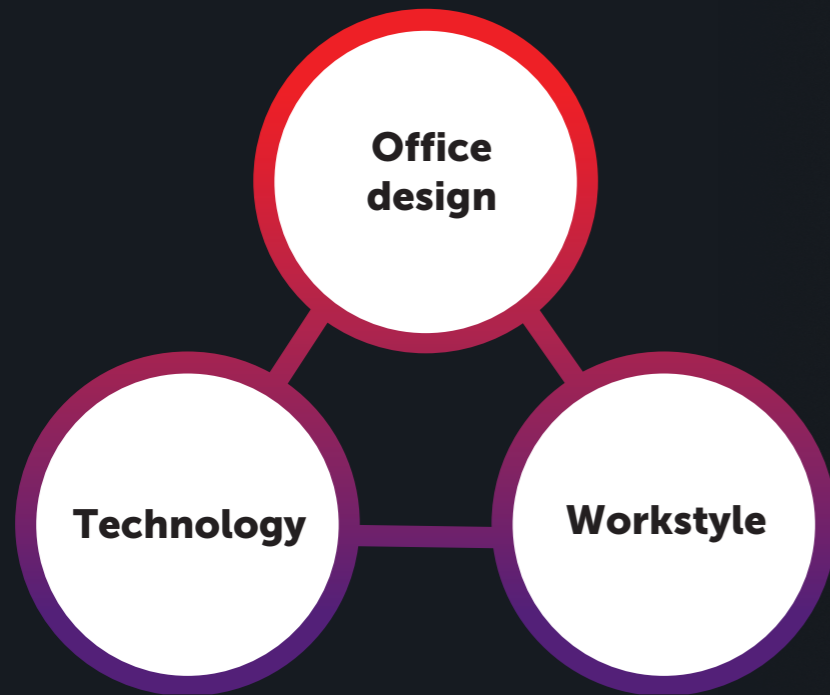
Workplace with a purpose, how?

The traditional allocation of 70% of space to desks and offices needs to be fundamentally challenged. 2. Collaboration and connection

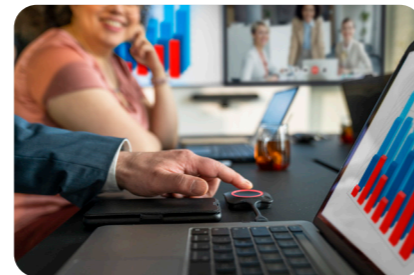
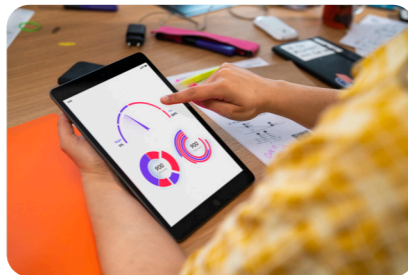
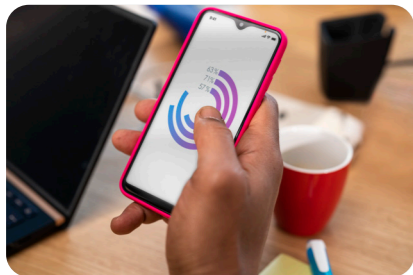
